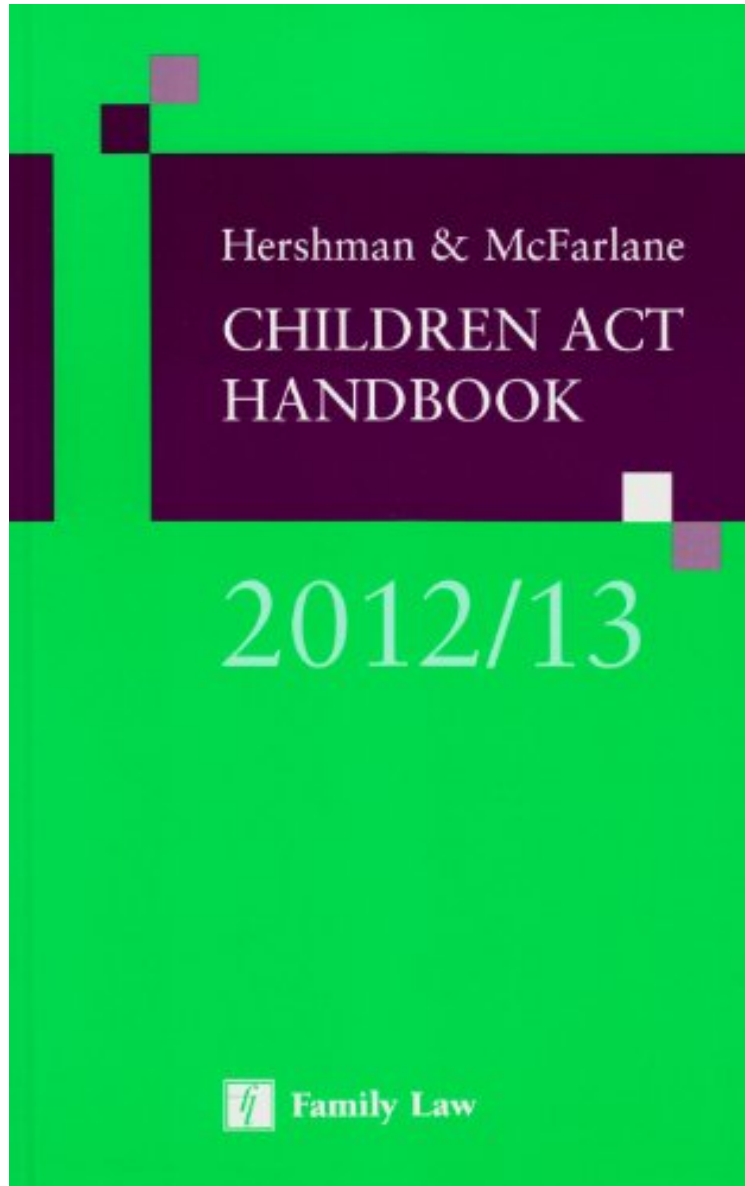

Part II consists of statutory instruments, including the Allocation and Transfer of Proceedings Order 2008 and the Family Procedure Rules 2010. Part III provides all relevant practice directions and guidance and, rather importantly for the busy practitioner, there's a handy calendar and list of holidays at the back in Part IV, which will certainly assist in forward planning, especially of court dates. Those in the know will agree that this carefully researched Handbook is a key resource in 2012 and 2013 for all those professionally involved in this complex and sensitive area of law and -- in this latest edition -- a must-have acquisition for the specialist practitioners library.
