This book is quite outdated, and often includes information from long before its publication date of 2006. It doesn't seem as if the editors even updated to that year. Moreover, there are grammatical errors all over the place, which at times can be distracting. If you are taking a class using this book, make sure that the professor is including some more updated material apart from cases and legal doctrine from this book.
